Dancer During the Day, Spy During the Night

Josephine Baker grew up poor, leaving school at a young age to support her family. She loved dancing, but segregation made her leave America. In 1925, she left for Paris at the age of 19 to pursue her dreams of being a dancer. After only a year, she became one of the most popular music-hall entertainers in France, but her life would change forever during the German occupation of France when she was recruited by the French resistance.

She started working with them, using her fame to travel and smuggle messages. Josephine used invisible ink to write secret messages in her sheet music and housed resistance fighters at her house, supplying them with visas. After the war, she continued performing and went on to live a long life. She was also given a Star of Honour and other awards for her bravery.

Soon after they announced their strike, the team was forced back to work under protest by Soccer Canada. They threatened the team with legal action to force them back to playing and might even consider taking millions in damages from them!

The team played in the SheBelieves Cup, but did it under protest. During their first practice back to protest, they wore their Soccer Canada shirts backwards and didn't show any Soccer Canada symbols.

Despite the tragic loss of Fred la Marmotte in Quebec, other provinces in Canada were able to get help from their own groundhogs.



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

February Recipe valentine sugar cookies





Instructions

Cream the butter and sugar together until fluffy. Add baking powder and salt, then mix. Add egg, milk, food colouring, and vanilla and mix. Slowly add in the flour and mix until combined. Let the dough chill for 3 hours or overnight. Preheat oven to 375°F. Roll out dough until thin and cut with cookie cutters. Bake in the oven for 8-10 minutes. Add sprinkles and icing if you'd like to add extra decoration!

Ingredients

- 2/3 cup butter
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 large egg
- 1 1/2 tbsp milk
- 1/2 tsp of red or pink food colouring
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups flour



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
