

Supporting Our Students: Food Programs at Esquimalt

For everyone in our school community, the Rainbow Kitchen "Fridge of Love" is always open! Students and staff are welcome to grab a snack—no questions asked, just kindness shared.

Student and Family Affordability Fund

In March 2024, the Ministry of Education and Child Care provided districts with one-time **Student and Family Affordability Funds (SFAF)** to help families struggling with school-related costs. These funds offer **temporary**, **flexible**, **and private** assistance for school supplies and fees, ensuring support without stigma.

Funding use includes, but is not limited to:

1. Goods:

- Providing basic school supplies that might otherwise be purchased by parents, guardians, and students (e.g., pens, paper); and
- Supporting with clothing/footwear required for school sports or other school activities.

2. Fees:

- Waiving education-related fees (e.g., additional supplies for shop, culinary and craft classes, workbooks, camps, field trips, relevant cultural events, other student society meetings including those related to equity, diversity, and inclusion, and instrument and equipment fees or other fees charged by school districts); and
- Fees for school sports and other school activities.


May 5 - Red Dress Day

Red Dress Day or Red Dress Campaign is an annual event held by the REDress Project in memory of the lives of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls and 2SLGBTQQIA+ People across Canada.

In 2010, Métis artist Jamie Black began this project as an art installation that hung hundreds of empty red dresses in public spaces to remind people of the First Nations, Métis, and Inuit women and girls lost because of gender-based violence. According to a report published by the RCMP in 2014, 1,017 women and girls who identified as Indigenous were murdered between 1980 and 2012 — a homicide rate that is almost 5 times higher than that of all other women in Canada.














Food Safe: 125 students complete their certification in 2025
