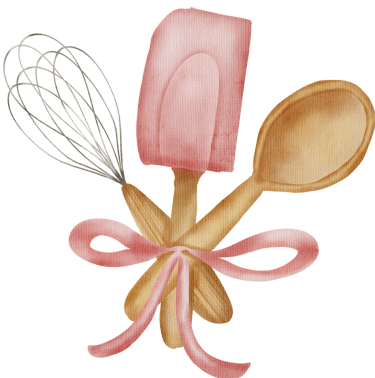

We had five delicious entries, including snickerdoodle, chocolate toffee, jam thumbprint, chocolate sprinkle, and a secret 67 cookie which attracted much attention to our table with their homemade mini umbrellas and their eye catching banana center. Each cookie brought something to the competition, but only one could take first place. We had over 45 scores submitted to us, and the judges had lots to say about each and every cookie.



In second place, with ten votes, and the first and only cookie to sell out, Ajax's legendary snickerdoodle cookie! A cookie that was passionately advertised by its bakers and it paid off. With people talking about the delicious cinnamon sugar coating, and excellent texture. Pulling in five tens, many eights, nines and one five for its taste factor. People specifically pointed out the nutmeg flavor. In the texture department it received a wide variety of scores, all the way from ten to four. Well done!

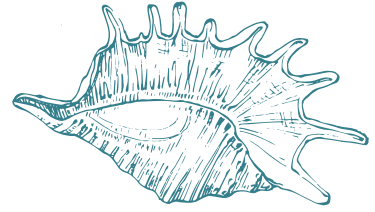

Me: What is your dream vacation?

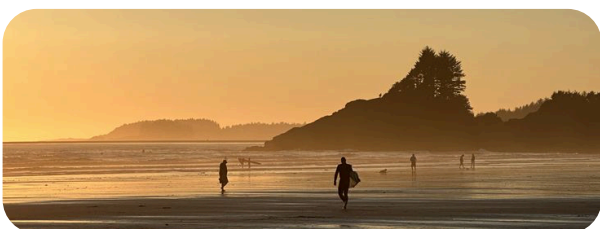

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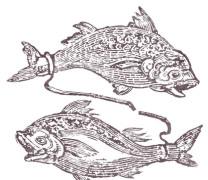

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# SUMMER MOVIE RECOMMENDATIONS



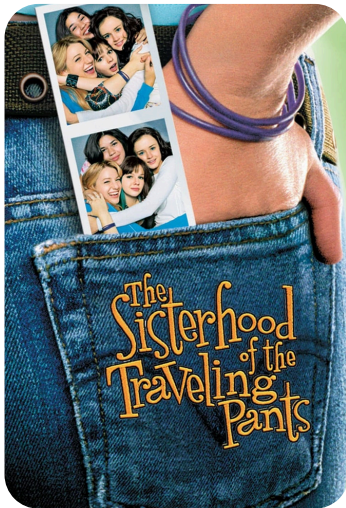
## MAMMA MIA!

Let's start off strong with a few looks that stood out to me!

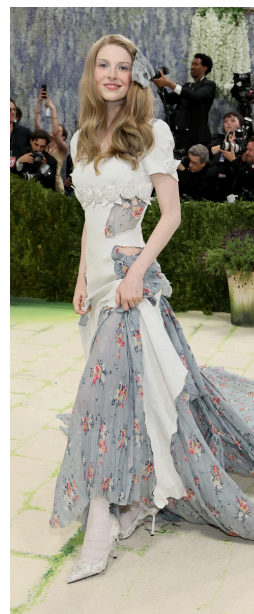
## Madonna



Madonna's look is Saint Laurent by Anthony Vaccarello. It is inspired by Leonora Carrington's 1945 painting, *The Temptation of St. Anthony, Fragment II*. I love this look for two reasons. It's based directly off of a piece of art, and the way the fabric moves when walking the red carpet makes it a living sculpture.



## Hunter Schafer



Hunter wore custom Prada inspired by Gustav Klimt's 1912-1913 painting *Mäda Primavesi*. This look is not only inspired by this painting, but it also really captures the youthfulness that we can see in the art piece. I am a fan of the small details like the head piece and how they play into the fact that when you first look at the painting you can't quite tell where the girl's skirt starts or ends, by creating a long train.

Rachel wore Atelier Prabal Gurung inspired by Paul Delaroche's famous 1833 painting, *The Execution of Lady Jane Grey*. I love the concept of this, and the idea was really there, but the execution fell quite a bit short. Not only is the design boring, but the fabric looks like it was bought off of Shein. Or a long yawn after a late Thanksgiving dinner.

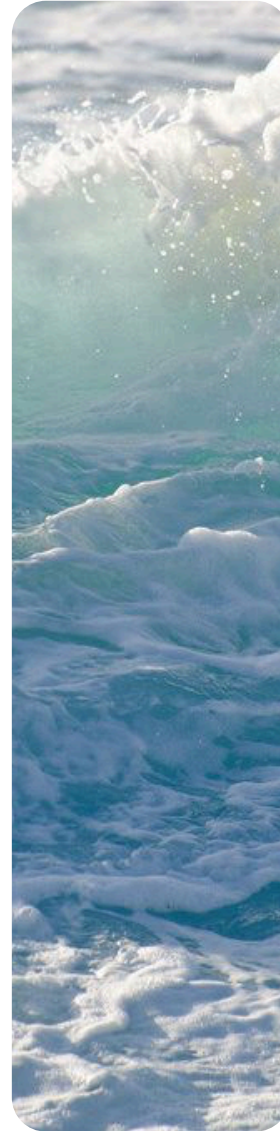
It sounds like a whisper carried by the clouds,

Frozen Peach Bellini



- 1 ½ cups fresh or frozen peaches (peeled and pitted), about the equivalent of 3 peaches
- 2 tablespoon sugar
- 1 cup ice cubes
- 1 ¼ cups club soda

# FOCACCIA

## Directions

1. In a large bowl, whisk flour, fine salt, and yeast. Pour in the lukewarm water and stir with a spatula until all the flour is incorporated. You should have a loose ball of dough. Scrape down the sides of the bowl to tidy. Drizzle the top and sides of the dough with 2 tablespoons of olive oil, spreading it under and over the top of the dough ball.
2. Rise. Cover the bowl, and let this rise for 1 ½ -2 hours on the counter (until doubled), or for 24-72 hours in the refrigerator (for the best flavor and airy texture).
3. Prep pan. Pour 2-3 tablespoons olive oil on the bottom and sides of a 10×14-inch Detroit-style metal pan (used in my photos). Or butter a 9×13-inch baking dish (\*see notes for using glass and ceramic). Always use butter with ceramic pans.
4. Stretch and fold. With an oiled hand loosen the edges of the dough from the bowl, and do a set of “stretch and folds”; use your fingers to pull the dough at the edge of the bowl, up and over and across itself, then turn the bowl 90 degrees, and repeat this 6 times, until you have a ball.
5. Rest. Pour the focaccia dough ball into the generously oiled pan. (I used a 10×14-inch pan) Let the dough rise uncovered and stretch out over the pan until doubled, roughly 45 minutes. Or allow 2-4 hours at room temperature for the best airy texture and flavor.
6. Preheat the oven to 425F (or 400F convection)
7. Now for the fun part: dimples! Drizzle the last tablespoon of olive oil over the dough, and with oiled fingers, poke holes straight down into the dough, creating deep dimples, gently nudging the dough towards the edges. If the dough resists, let it rest for 5 minutes, and resume. Sprinkle with the flaky sea salt and rosemary.
8. Bake on the middle rack for 25-30 minutes, until puffed, golden brown, and the bottom is crisp and golden. Let rest 10 minutes before slicing.

## Ingredients

4 cups flour, spooned and levelled. Use all-purpose flour or bread flour or a blend. (Bread flour has a higher protein content that will result in a chewier texture- I prefer to blend these flours.)

2 teaspoons fine salt

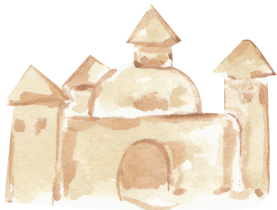
2 teaspoons instant rise yeast (see notes)

2 cups lukewarm water (450 grams)

5 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided

1–2 teaspoons flaky sea salt

1 tablespoon fresh rosemary

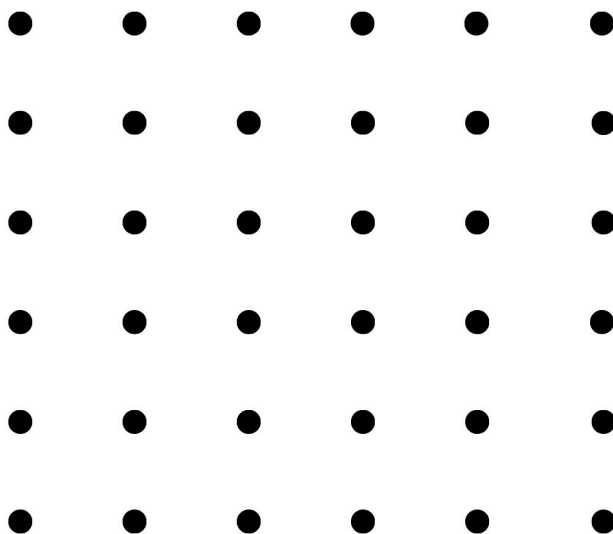
